Has your child got the balance right?

At MFHS, the staff as a collective are strong advocates of students having a balanced life. By this, we value the importance of school, study, sport, work, hobbies and down time.

Message from the Uniform Shop regarding Sizing

The sizing used for our school uniforms is youth sizing, not the sizing you would find in a shop for your everyday clothing. This is because uniform suppliers supply the same clothing from Kindergarten to Year 12, and potentially work wear as well, so they usually use a different sizing chart. The youth sizing goes from 4 through to 40+, with each even number being one size up from the last.

For this reason it is important for you to always try on your uniforms to ensure the correct fit.

Keeping the Academic Pedal to the Metal

The term holidays are a great time for our Year 12 students to consolidate on work cover during the first half of the year. This will be particularly important from 2019 as students no longer have a formal half yearly exam that 'forces' them to undertake this exercise.

Work that can be undertaken by students during the holidays could include:

- Rewrite all their notes in bullet form
- Convert their bullet form notes into mind maps
- Attempt past papers on topics they have already completed
- Rewrite any essays that they have written this year
- Get on with any assessable assignments

Senior Student's and Cars

PLEASE stress to your student the importance of driving safely when leaving school of an afternoon. While I can appreciate their desire to race home and study (or attack the fridge) it is essential that driving is very careful around school zones.

Winter Uniform

Just a reminder that boys in Years 11 and 12 are required to wear a tie for Terms 2 and 3. It is a good idea to have a look at some of the shirts the boys are wearing. They grow so quickly at this age they often outgrow their shirt in a 12 month period. Boys are required to keep their top button done up when wearing a tie. If the shirt is too small it creates issues in terms of compliance and discomfort.

Hoodies, Beanies and Undershirts that show beyond the length of the top layer of uniform are not acceptable. After Easter it will get cold rather quickly. Please ensure that students have a sloppy-joe or knitted uniform jumper for the start of the cold season. We keep a range of pre-loved and washed jumpers so that any student who attends school in the incorrect jumper will be asked to leave their jumper in my office for the day and borrow one of the school jumpers.

Lost Property

Please ensure that all items of clothes have your student's name clearly displayed in the item. Every week I have numerous items of clothes handed to me and 1 in 10 has a name in it. It is impossible for us to get the item back to the rightful owner without a name.

Years 11 and 12 Parent/Teacher night

Uniform

Although we continue to experience warm weather it is timely to be reminded that winter is on its way. It is compulsory for Year 11 boys to wear a tie for Terms 2 and 3. The navy woolmix knitted jumper/navy sweater with the MFHS gold logo is the only acceptable jumper. Patterned jackets, coloured sloppy joes, hooded jackets, long sleeve undershirts (unless covered by a jumper), beanies, denim jeans, skin tight leggings or any items with visible brand names are not permitted. Please ensure all items are labelled!

All students are currently completing the 'Tell Them From Me' survey. This is an opportunity for students to tell us what they think and give their opinion on things that matter at school. It will help us identify changes that can improve our school. Under no circumstances should takeaway food be delivered to students at school. This only creates a problem for other students. If your child has forgotten their lunch they can report to me for a canteen pass, and the money can be repaid the following day. Your cooperation in this matter is appreciated.

Mobile Phones and Technology

I remind all students and parents of our school policy: if a student brings a mobile phone to school it is to be turned off and not used during school hours. Along with this students bringing BYOD devices to school are not permitted to use this device to play games at any time or engage with social media. These activities can lead to problems such as bullying and harassment, distraction and social division.



Year 7 are well underway with their preparation for their first assessment, The Narrative Writing Task in Week 10. Students have studied a variety of short stories to get their creative juices flowing and understand what is required to write a short, engaging narrative.

Year 8 have finished reading their class novels and are about to complete their Essay Assessment Task this week. They have explored the themes, characters and techniques used in their novels and are busy revising key information to ensure they can respond to a question with a sustained answer in the essay form.

Year 9 English have completed their Narrative Task and are now exploring a suite of poems in the module 'War and Peace'. They have a Reading and Language Assessment in Week 11.

Year 9 Drama have just completed their first assessment, a Melodrama Performance looking at 'Lady Audley's Secret'. Here they are dressed in fine Melodramatic costume!





Year 10 Drama have just completed their Mime and Movement Assessment which provided many interesting and engaging performances through using mask and sound track to set the tone for their piece.

Year 10 English have begun presenting their Multimodal Assessment which includes a speech and reflection. These tasks are new to our Year 10 program this year and are aimed at building skills for the new HSC assessment requirements.

Year 11 are finalising their Reading to Write Portfolios which are due Monday 8th April. Students are reminded to return their copies of 'The Simple Gift' before the end of the term.

Year 11 English Studies are busy preparing for their Mock Job Interviews and submission of their Resume and Cover Letter for their first assessment. Students have looked at a range of media to broaden their knowledge of the workplace, rights and responsibilities at work and the 'How-to' on resumes, cover letters and interviews.

Year 12 Advanced and Standard classes are busy finalising their study of Module A and preparing for their second HSC assessment next Friday. Year 12 English Studies are finishing off their study of Felicity Castagna's "The Incredible Here and Now". They have been working towards their Multimodal Presentation Task where they will be presenting their speech from the perspective of a key character from the novel.

Year 12 students have been practising their skills in discursive writing as part of the new HSC requirements for Module C: The Craft of Writing. Below is a short sample written by Nicholas C which was inspired by the article, 'Self-improvement in the nick of time', from Richard Glover for the Sydney Morning Herald.

Do you ever see something that you don't understand and think, "I want to know how that works"? Maybe you drive your car every day and one day it came to your mind that you don't know what's happening underneath the bonnet. It's such a great feeling when you finally figure it out, and then you see something else and the cycle repeats itself. FROM THE MATHEMATICS FACULTY

This weeks' news:

Year 7 World of Maths Incursion

We are looking forward to the Year 7 World of Maths incursion on Thursday 4th April. The students will be working in small groups and will participate in hands-on activities that require them to use their Mathematical knowledge and higher order thinking skills. This is a compulsory incursion as it is part of the Working Mathematically outcomes for the Year 7 Mathematics Syllabus.

Calculators:

Please make sure that all students have their own calculator. The Casio fx-82AU PLUS II is sold at the uniform shop for \$35. Students need this calculator from Year 7. It is vital for their progress that students are familiar with their calculator and know how to use the different functions.

Assessments for Term 1

This year we are using common tests for Years 7 to 10 instead of written assignments. A common test is a topic test for the first two topics of Term 1. The Year 8, 9 and 10 common tests have been completed and have been marked and returned to students.

Marked examinations have been returned to students in these year groups with feedback to help students know how they can improve in future. Students are also completing feedback sheets in order to help them reflect on which of their preparation strategies were most effective.

Year 7's common test is still being marked and results will be returned to this year group on Thursday of week 9. Marked examination papers will be returned Thursday of week 10.

Any students who missed their common test will be completing it upon their return to school after an absence.

Year 12 Mid-Year Review

These exams will be held during Week 10: 3rd, 4th and 5th April and Week 11 8th April for Extension 2, Extension 1, 2U and Standard 2.

Year 12 Standard 1 Assignment

These students should be well underway with their assignment which is due on Thursday 28th March.

Year 11 Mid-Year Review

These exams will take place during Week 2 of Term2.

Mathletics

Mathletics is regularly set for homework and revision for Years 7 to 10. Please encourage your child to ensure that they are completing this on a regular basis.

We thank the P&C for their continuing generosity in sponsoring our subscription to Mathletics again in 2019 for Years 7 to 10. Mathletics encourages students of all abilities by giving instant feedback and providing practice.

Please note that Mathletics accounts have been assigned to all students in Years 7 to 10.

What happens if my child is absent for a common test or won't be at school to submit an assignment?

Year 12 Biology Excursion

It is listed as one of the world's 10 weirdest museums, presenting 2000 examples of human disease. Instructors gave talks on topics, such as the effects of alcohol consumption, smoking, cardiovascular and liver disease. MFHS students were able to experience and use this fantastic learning resource which is relevant to their modules on Infectious and non-infectious diseases. The subject is also relevant to those students interested in the field of epidemiology, medicine and physiology. 



Community Access Program – Support Unit Stage 6






Overall, this camp was a fantastic and enjoyable experience for the student leaders who were able to form close bonds with one another while also performing important leadership duties.

#### NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM – SCHOOL NEWSLETTER TO PARENTS/GUARDIANS

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2019 the following vaccines will be offered:

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to you by your child's school. To consent to the vaccination of your child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided;
- complete the consent form, including signing your name next to each of the vaccine/s you would like your child to receive;
- return the completed consent form to your child's school;
- ensure that your child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phone the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at <a href="https://www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation">www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation</a>.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed vaccine/s throughout the year where possible.

Please note that students who commence the HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year 7 but do not complete the course during the school year may be offered a catch-up dose at school in Year 8. Students who have their first HPV dose at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. You should ensure that this record is kept for future reference. Please do not assume that your child has been vaccinated if you do not receive this Record of Vaccination. Vaccination records will be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) to provide a complete immunisation history for your child.

# Tell Them From Me student survey Frequently Asked Questions (parents and carers)

## Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation

## What is the Tell Them From Me student survey?

The Tell Them From Me student survey asks questions about factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other outcomes. It aims to help improve the learning outcomes of students. The survey is designed to measure, assess and report insights from the student point of view at the school and system levels. The focus of this NSW survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

## 2. What kind of questions will the survey ask?

The survey questions relate to the following measures for primary schools:

## 3. How have schools been selected to take part?

The survey is open to all NSW government schools at no cost to them. Your child's school has decided to participate.

## 4. How will taking part in this survey benefit my child's school?

The Tell Them From Me student survey will provide school principals and school leaders with insight into student engagement, wellbeing and effective teaching practices at their school, from the perspective of students.

Data collected from the survey responses are quickly compiled into reports for school leaders. Principals can then use this information to help them identify emerging issues and plan for school improvement.

## 5. What does my child need to do to participate in the survey?

The survey typically takes less than 30 minutes and is conducted entirely online through a secure website operated by the survey developers, The Learning Bar. Schools will make computers or laptops available so that students can complete the survey during school hours.

#### 6. Does my child have to participate?

No, participation in the survey is optional. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped. Parents/students have a right to apply for access to, and correction of, a student's information.

## 7. Will the school be able to identify my child from their responses?

Staff in schools will not be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will not be made available.

A small number of staff in the department's Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) will have access to Individual student responses for the purpose of state-wide analysis. Individual students' data will be held on a secure server with access strictly limited to CESE researchers. The researchers are interested in trends only – not in individual student responses. No student will be identified in any publication. No school will be identified unless they have given permission.

## 8. What sort of analysis will be done on the survey data?

Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days. School leaders can use the data to better understand the experiences and views of students at their school.

CESE will undertake state-wide analysis of the survey data in conjunction with existing student data held by the department, including performance data.

The results will help all schools better understand the relationship between wellbeing, engagement, effective teaching and student learning. Results from CESE's analysis of this data will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes. This supports the department's continuing focus on quality teaching and leadership. The data will be retained for future analysis to help us better understand the nature of student engagement and wellbeing over time.

## Can all school students participate in the survey?

The primary school survey is designed for students in Years 4 to 6. Schools are encouraged to allow as many students as possible in these year groups to participate. Secondary schools are encouraged to allow as many students as possible in Years 7 to 12 to participate.

## 10. When will the Tell Them From Me survey happen?

The surveys will be conducted in all participating schools at the end of Term 1 and (optionally) Term 3/4.

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#### What is CESE2

The Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) is part of the NSW Department of Education.

CESE has been established to improve the effectiveness, efficiency and accountability of education in New South Wales.

CESE will identify and share what works, creating new opportunities to improve teaching and learning across all of education.

## What is The Learning Bar?

The Learning Bar specialises in research-based design and facilitation of student assessments and survey solutions for both primary and secondary students. The in-house research team led by the President, Dr J Douglas Willims, undertakes extensive projects used in the school system to affect national policy. It is against this research that the survey, Tell Them From Me, has become the largest national school survey in Canada, used in nine of the ten provinces. Globally, more than 6,300 schools and 5.4 million students have participated in the survey over the last twelve years.

Dr Willims recently held the Tier 1 Canada Research Chair in Literacy and Human Development. He plays a lead role in the development of questions on student engagement for the OECD's Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA).

For purely administrative purposes, The Learning Bar will also have temporary access to identifiable student responses to the survey questions. Other than The Learning Bar and CESE researchers within the department, identifiable student responses will not be disclosed to any other person or body other than as required by law.
